Recently, a number of philosophers have maintained that stuff outside the head—for example, social, moral, and political arrangements—can matter for blameworthiness and responsible agency. Such approaches are sometimes presented as superior alternatives to comparatively individualistic approaches to responsibility that do not emphasize the role of extra-agential features in moral responsibility. This course looks at the state of play on these matters. We will focus on recent proposals, ongoing challenges to them, and the possibility of instructive parallels outside of the theory of moral responsibility.

Response papers: five short weekly reading response papers (600 words max), turned in between weeks 2 and 8. Each paper should be sent as an e-mail attachment to da prof by 8 pm on the day before the seminar in which the relevant issues will be discussed. Your grade will be calculated based on the grades of your five best papers. (This means that you can turn in all seven and drop the lowest three grades, or you can simply turn in five). Your paper should engage with one of the readings for the week, and do one of the following (or something similar): (i) provide a careful reconstruction of a difficult piece of reasoning to be found in a relevant text, (ii) evaluate the validity or soundness of an argument in a relevant text, (iii) articulate and provide support for a philosophical position that competes with those found in the relevant texts, or (iv) offer a new defense of a position found in the reading. At least once in the term, you will be asked to present the substance of your response paper to the class. You won't be graded on it, but you are expected to do it at least once.

Term paper: First, you'll do a prospectus (emailed attachment) delivered to me by *Thursday at 8pm of Week 8*, topic chosen in consultation with el profe. Second, you will submit a 4500-5500 word paper sent by email attachment. *Paper due March 22nd at 8pm.*
