This course is designed for majors to develop their skills in understanding, constructing, evaluating, presenting, and discussing philosophical arguments and writing about them in clear and careful ways. The small seminar format will offer occasions for all of these activities in ample measure. Every student must come to class prepared to discuss the assigned reading in detail. Students will write a paper every week for the first six weeks. Two of these papers will be revised and resubmitted. Students will also write a substantive term paper.

The topic of the seminar is what is meant by phrases such as “in virtue of” “because of”, “results in” or “grounding”. We will pursue the notion both in general and in particular cases.
