## **Topic: Epistemic Revolutions from the Beginning of the 20th-century to the Present**

Epistemology underwent several revolutions from the beginning of the 20th-century to the present. Starting with background classes on truth and logic, we will proceed to study seven major revolutions in 20th-century epistemology. The goal is to critically evaluate these revolutions in an attempt to anticipate the future direction of epistemology.
