Course description:

The aim of the class is to bring philosophical tools to bear on debates about moral issues that are of contemporary importance. Over the course of the quarter students will engage with philosophical literature examining ethical questions that are the subject of current debate. Topics include the status of animals, the permissibility of civil disobedience, conscience clauses in medicine, questions in reproductive medicine including abortion, and debates about the removal of public statues.
